ACT Student Web Account

Students can set up an ACT Student Web Account to register for the ACT. The student account allows students to make changes to their test option, test date, or test center; add, change, or delete college choices; receive email updates from ACT about registration; view scores; and request additional score reports.

for iPhone®, iPad®, iPod touch®, and for Android

Capture and upload an iPad photo of your face with ACTPhoto to submit to ACT for identification purposes. Students registering to take the ACT are required to submit a photo before they can print their ACT admission ticket. First, create an ACT web account at **www.actstudent.org**. You can then log in with your ACT Web User ID and password to upload the photo from the mobile app. On upload, ACTPhoto will verify whether the submitted photo meets ACT requirements.



When students receive scores from one of the ACT assessments, they receive a personalized report. This report suggests map regions and career areas on the ACT World-of-Work Map for students to explore.


